9:15 – 11:15 Equal and Different: Modern Women in Traditional Families

In every religious tradition, the man-woman relationship is considered the basic unit of the family. Modernity has however introduced new models of interaction between men and women. Throughout the last centuries, this relation has been increasingly modeled on cooperation and mutuality. This change of paradigm has also been paralleled by a clear effort of reinterpretation of those sacred texts that pertain to male and female roles in the family. In the first panel, women scholars from each monotheistic tradition will share their experience of wives and mothers living in the 21st century. Does equality entail roles-identity or complementarity? What, if any, is the unique contribution of women of faith to the changing spousal relationship models? How can religious and political institutions favour fair and solid relations in the family?

Religious education may represent a challenge for mothers, living in the age of "liquid modernity." On the one hand, modern techno-scientific advancements have contributed to the culture of "disenchantment" and to the marginalization of the Transcendent. On the other hand, the prioritization of individual choices has challenged traditional models of authority and religious practice.
